for the people who are yet too little civilized, not gladly to wish to return

are sent as mediators shall not be molested, but shall be listened to. Contractors

before they have been offered to the Commandant.

Art 11 Any subject gaining his relations as a present or "dash" to the Quibbers or
"Teropentes," shall pay as much as he claims they are indebted to him;
& also be punished with a penalty, since wrong is allowed to give another as a "dash"

Art 12 To leave unmolested all hatterland borders going or coming ^{not} to the place

Art 13. Not to molest the Military, gornit slaves, or servants of the Commandant:

but if any molestation is committed by the above named, application may be made to the Commandant: but no one is permitted to take the law into ^{his} own hands.

Art 14. The Commandant, on receiving a palaver, shall receive one sheep, or the value thereof in gold: on a bullock being brought in for custody, the witch shall receive as cross-money (hoijfeld), 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ $\frac{1}{2}$ for a woman: & $\frac{1}{2}$ $\frac{1}{2}$ super for a woman.

Art 15. If the Commandant shall summon one of the subjects, she does not appear, a penalty of 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ shall be imposed: if he is sick he shall send one of his own family or heirs.

Art 16. The Coloceros being in the small upper & lower towns, shall not permit any Atzin canoes to land there with fish, in order by so doing to evade the proper toll for the fish: but shall drive them away to Atzin, those Coloceros who are discovered acting contrary to this shall incur a penalty of 1 $\frac{1}{2}$.

Art 17. The Atzins & other Gornit people shall be obliged to make palavides round their houses, the Coloceros shall remove to a bush village without permission.

Art 18. If the Natives bring foodstuffs to market properly, none of the soldiers or gornit slaves are permitted to fetch the same out of the houses.

Art 19. No servants, whether military or slaves, shall be allowed to pay for Palu wine on the roads; but on the other hand the Natives shall voluntarily sell to these palu wine ^{which} is brought into the town, & is not required for waiting Customs: on refusal to do this, it may be payfarred.

because of the prejudices of the natives, & their attachment to the land of their birth, which
appears to be reason why Van den Bosch could not obtain the 150 natives. But Van den Bosch
did not despair, & from his report of 12 January 1832, he it appeared that he cherished
the hope of attaining his object with the cooperation of the King of Achantee, as he, on the
occasion of receiving a messenger, had intimated him to write & urge the King to do so.

By a letter written by Van den Bosch dated 14 March 1832 723, to the Govr Genl
of Neeth: India a copy of which was enclosed in his Despatch to the Minister of Colonies,
of 24th of that month 1832, report of that Mission was also given to the Govr Genl
of the result of it was stated to be, that the messenger had returned with the report that
the King of Achantee had readily promised & undertaken to send men, but that
they would follow in a few days, partly because the time was too short, partly
because his main army had been sent on an expedition farther inland, had not
yet returned, but was expected daily, to which Van den Bosch added, that as soon as these
recruits should arrive, it was not improbable that the time which was to be
to elapse before a transport ship could arrive to fetch them, would give an opportunity
to other lesser Chiefs in the interior to follow the King of Achantee's example.

Meanwhile I continue to regard it as not entirely impossible, to attain the
desired object, without undue haste, slowly & by some degrees.

But of any favourable outcome of the King of Achantee's promise, no report
has come to the Minister of Colonies, still less of any further exhibiting of native
recruits, & so it is presumed that nothing took place later in this respect.

From a letter from the Govr Genl of Neeth: India of 29 Aug^t 1832 no 218 it
appears that the cost of maintaining the before mentioned natives at Java has been
much too high, having amounted to f 54,218, or f 1232 per head - as to write
it was necessary to proceed further with the recruiting. Nevertheless it appears also,
that the reason for this is to be sought in the fact that it was agreed with the
ship owners for the transport of 150 men, that if this had succeeded the expenses
would have amounted to f 61000, & so only f 404.20 per head, which is

Muchan to the 1st Regt Appoll: Fort 4 February 1655 / M.D.S / I have no
doubt but you have already heard of my complete
success over the Appolls: when the Troops sadly routed & dispersed. All
Kunich's people, the Elmua Musfatters, the Carriers, Luini this people or so,
ran away at the very first ^{fire} shot. Some of them were attacked when
running away, were taken or killed, - whereas not a man would have been
lost if they had had sense to obey my orders, & to stand by me. - Of the
Soldiers a few got trifling wounds but they are all now well. Regret
much, however, to say that one of your Soldiers named Kossoler, was
accidentally struck by a Rocket which took a wrong direction, notwithstanding
very attention was paid to him by the Surgeon of the Regt of War, he lost his
life. He was buried with all the honours of war; & may you will give his Family
or my own twenty Gallons of Rum, & four English of Powder to make Comfort
for him. / The King & Chiefs of Appollonia have all dispersed into the Bush
but I am in hopes I shall get them to come in quietly without more
fighting, but if they persist in keeping away, they may give us some
trouble. However we are here, perfectly secure, & can do ^{act} ~~act~~ us to ease,
but it may be sometime before I can settle matters. / They leave again to

thank you for your kindness in sending your troops, who, with my own
people, are more than sufficient to beat all Apollonians I should again write
to you very soon: in the meantime I am Yrs or Geo M.

James Salway to Lewis. C.C. 4 February 1835 / M.D.S. / My men were

not more last night having been ordered, did not slightly

four, who were forced away in the Canoe) did so through their fear & cowardice.
You may be glad to hear that the Wassans has got hold of Thunisia, who with
his people behaved very badly, might have ruined the whole Expedition. When the
Enemy first appeared I ordered his people to advance, when they plainly told
me "that they never promised to fight, but only to cross the river with me". There
has been made to pay back by 2/3 of Old Powder &c. (Any intelligence
you can get of the Wassans, you will greatly oblige me by communicating by a
3rd Canoe as early as possible; on them my interests (for the present) depend.
I hope you have had a pleasant journey from Alumina, that I shall have the
pleasure of seeing you soon at Brain to thank you in person for your prompt
assistance. Believe me &c.

Message to the Wassans. April 1st 21 February 1755 / Since I had lost
the pleasure of writing to you I have had the satisfaction
of so far settling matters, as to receive by God as security (I have kept for 15 years;
but I have been totally unable to bring the people back to their Wells: or to
induce them to lay down their arms. I have insisted on seeing the thing
determining that if he refuses to appear, for with the Alumina will be obliged

This has alarmed them & today the King ordered to meet me outside the Port

length which is impassible except by canoes. On the least alarm, the King with
his Picars, women & old men, cross the river & disperse themselves thro' out
the whole of the Country where it wd with a small force be almost impossible to
follow them with any effect; so that I think it better to temporise a little, & endeavor
to manage affairs ^{watters} & ^{stacty} ^{diff}. Messrs have just come in to say that the King will
meet me at a hill; about 2 miles from Fort Jerred & Godere without troops!!
A very modest proposition truly! I know not but he will not bear reason unless
pressed into it. If therefore you could be kind enough to order Mr Younger, who
thinks the country well to make a slight demonstration on the river with a few men, the
news wd soon fly up to the King who wd get himself alarmed. I have but little
hopes of Coffee Pedars coming down, altho' mine is more interested in the matter: Coffee Pedars
& if he can come a small party he is certainly bound to do so. If only a few
Wossaws were to make their appearance just now, it wd have as much effect as if
a large force were to come. Let watters, however, turn out as they will,
I have accomplished more than I ever expected ever before first. (I have got
out of the Villains' hands upwards of 60 prisoners with their pretty - got
some gold to pay ^{my} buy ees, at least I hope it will work, as so, got besides
security sufficient to prevent the King offering in small matters, & if he did
again consent offences of women, the security will always be sufficient to pay
the costs of anwer expedition. He thins also that he is not in in in, which is

great, indeed the greatest point gained; & in future I must listen to reason.

Still since I am here I am naturally anxious to see matters settled on the paper before I go; although I remain here at a great expense, every day costing me a great deal of money. On the whole: I think I shall stay a little longer to see what can be done: if I cannot manage to see the thing finally I shall then settle matters of business of Messrs Bartels & Swarzy as well as possible & return home (in comparison) in a world. By the way I ought to mention that Mr Bartels since we came here has been of great service in many ways as he knows the people & their language as well. I probably we have plenty of persons such as they are. Mr Swarzy of Cdr has sent me up a set of 100 of your books & some of the soldiers. Your men have behaved very quietly indeed & have given us trouble. My men obey us duty & as naturally as if they belonged to the same Corps. . . . I hope from coming for I am on the way:

Since writing above I have seen much ~~of~~ I think I may now consider ours fairly settled. I never saw a man more frightened in my life. Do not put yourself to any more trouble on my acct, only the Prussians had better keep & look out & show themselves a little.

and the Ambaros which will be of the greatest service, they may cross over with perfect
safety as there are scarcely any troops to oppose them, the Appollis: as was so
thoroughly frightened that a parcel of children would make them fly. Last night the

already heard of the Abantia being on the River side, & are so alarmed that
they are making ready to run away altogether; - I only fear that, from their fear

They will keep entirely out of our way, & thus deprive us of an opportunity of settling
waters. It will be better for the Plantas to remain near Delaware, where I
will communicate with them by land, but if they cross the road between I
suspect the Appoles: will entirely disperse themselves. / Today the King
sent to us to say that he will send his people over about in two or three days, to
run away as they will send fresh troops coming against them. I have told him
that I might have sent a messenger to stop them, if he will comply & agree with my
demands, & I must wait for an answer, for all things probably have
run us by land, before this reaches you. I shall demand ^{another} ~~of~~ 100
but soon much I shall not be able to get it. Therefore, hope I shall be able
as little as possible as the cesses are already very great. However I shall do
all in my power to satisfy all parties. ... Palmer and so.

Message to the King Appole: 2nd March 1755 / It is ^{dated} letter of today
[1755] reached me two hours ago. My favor for
detaining ^{the} the canoe ... was that I might have something definite
to communicate before writing to you. But the Appollonians are certainly the
most troublesome people I ever had to deal with - every day for the last week
they have sent in to say that they are busy collecting the debts & run away
thence demanded of me, have actually paid a little money every day.
The day before yesterday however lost all patience, & sent a party to inquire
in order if possible to lay hold of some persons of impudence, & thus for the
King to deal with my orders directly. They are, however, caught three persons
of no great impudence; but even this has ^{alarmed} the King, I must think that
he will settle with Palmer brought against him. As to the Plantas

if I could any prospect of getting 50 or 100 men from Beulah to pay
their debts, I could gladly support their coming up alone. - but I am much
afraid that I have already spent more money than I can afford to pay, & besides
of the Abakos to walk, denizens of Apitima. I should be happy that they came up
two weeks earlier than, instead of coming it, passed on along the opposite
bank to this, by which means they wd completely surround Beulah & all
his Chiefs. The second river must parallel to the brook is distant from the
port only 30 minutes walk; Beulah this Chiefs being on this side wd
of course, if the Abakos went up the western bank be found between them
and me. This wd be a sure plan at least to oppress & oppression to

In that Treaty were embodied various Rules which were deemed requisite for the better protection of the rights of the merchants & traders in the prosecution of their newly resumed Commerce with Arbante the Interior. In the discussions which took place (in the presence of all the Parties interested) prominently Arbante Rules being offered by the Families & others strenuously insisted upon the restoration of the Markets, which had existed in Paranassie before the War; which proposal was at first strenuously resisted by the Whites; & it was finally understood & agreed upon by all Parties, that there should be no intermediate markets. At that the Arbante & its traders from the Interior should trade directly with the merchants in the Coast. / Contrary however to this understood arrangement, & contrary to all former precedent, an intermediate market has, as far as all are aware, sprung up near Arbante. This market has all along been viewed with much dissatisfaction by the King & people of Arbante, the former of whom ^{well} has hitherto restrained from finally breaking it up by his fear of displeasing the Whites. Among the Chiefs of Arbante, in particular, this market has caused the greatest dissatisfaction as it has had the effect of almost entirely depriving them of the great benefits they formerly derived from their trade in Arbante, with the Interior. At length it appears they have resolved to get, if possible, rid of it; & the King has ordered some strong remonstrance upon the subject, wherein he represents the great injury done his people by this market, the benefits that would accrue to the Whites themselves, were the trade carried on, as it was

originally intended in this case. / with the efforts of the present system of
trade upon fair interests, for, furthermore, as much better acquainted than I
can pretend to be. It is sufficient to state here, that by many of you, it has been

However under these circumstances the best course must be to prevent any disturbance with our neighbors with only the dentures of the whole surrounding country in war which, however it might not be utterly ruin all trade for years to come. I shall, therefore, have no time in sending to the States to inform the reason of this conduct, tho' I think that he must restore the people. But, to inform the States I earnestly beg that they will order the Governor of this State to pay back Charles's slaves who it I am almost certain has caused this affair. In fact notwithstanding Charles's justice I have decided some such thing; for these people whom they have just claim never, I will think, demand it.



The third & boy, escaped through intelligence of what had taken place to a person called Quotey Cotjee (one of the Pygmees of Dutch Heera who then had joined the Agvambos in their war with the Crepes) who immediately applied with Agotini Chiefs for redress, which was granted to the individual who had committed the crime was given up & sent down to Dutch Heera, where he according to the custom of the country was cut to pieces, this shall not parts of his body as yet hanging on their drums or musical instruments. After this act of Black Justice had taken place, the matter was considered terminated, there was no more speaking about it until the Agotini Chiefs - who on each of their wars joined the Agvambos in their war with the Crepes were afraid of leaving their country, resolving to come down into the sea coast to trade

give for having fallen upon the Asotins, is that they wanted to make
them pay the value of the goods which belonged to the two persons above
mentioned who were killed in their country, but that it was not their (the
Dutch Accras) intention to kill any of them. As I have not had it in
my power to support the parties, I am not able to ascertain how far this may
be correct, or not, but I can only wonder, that if such is the case, why the Accras

I would at once buy 2000 men of them, if they did their best to provide

20 October Same to same. - The King gave the following reply to Kanyasaper [is a letter from Tommweyer - not on record] at a meeting of the King's house at which 10 Europeans were present: - "That he had been made aware by me of the violence of the people of Kaif Kaifekou in ill-treating your person respecting you by the orders of the Governor of Amkowsaie when U.E.B. & by giving such very good attention to make that part of the road good & to bring about peace for all. He further said that after peace was concluded between him & the English, the English Deputies & all the papers of these Nocos were separated, from him & since that time have remained as English subjects, and it will be necessary to inform the English Government of their conduct."

His Highness said further that nothing will be more pleasing to him in the event of your being able to make the open up the road, though he is also for any it put on his side, or to work & carry the road. But he is very certain that if he has to begin from Pusan, very serious differences will arise in less than 3 days, for they have arisen so far, about having the road there. Therefore if U.E.B. meets all your efforts to get it ready - some ready he also will do what best, & so doing to fulfill the promises to the General Merchant. I had a conversation with the King some days ago, & it appears from his utterances that he is ready to make war with anyone, but that the first one who places obstacles in his way must expect the consequences.

The King states that the heavy rains might even have prevented him from complying with the King's order by the arrival for the supply of recruits, as it has been impossible to get to Amkowsaie with many boats, but the rainy season is nearly over, when they can proceed - . . . Some days ago two English & two Danish soldiers arrived here, who have escorted some women & children of Boatin. I think Boatin will now himself shortly come to his town Djaben.

24 November Same to Comdr a.i. Van der Elst. Acknowledges his letter of the 8th instant recd on the 18th. Nothing has made us so sad as to learn of the death of the Commander & the other gentlemen. The Comdr ought to have taken better measures, as he was told beforehand that all the Abante people were ready waiting for him, as U.E.B. knows the population of the whole of the

Ahanta territory is very large to fight with such a small force, but it is too late
now to say anything further about it, but I think that they will in time get
payment in full satisfaction. I reported the thing the purport of your wishes
in your letter, His Highness was very much surprised to hear this surprising
news. I have also informed him that U.E.G. would like to see his ideas (gedachten)
about this occurrence. His Highness who appears to try & do everything for us
stated that as U.E.G. had written to Holland about this insolent conduct of
de Plantas he requests U.E.G. to await further news. He would of course
give his ideas without delay about what had occurred with de Plantas,
but as this has been once reported, it seems desirable to him to await the
reply, what ever U.E.G. is instructed shall be instructed to do for Holland

from the Windward coast of St. Paulina to all the Ahanta places. This would
be very advantageous to our side.

5th December Same to Same. In my former I made some reports
to U.E.G. about the ideas of de Plantas with regard to the
crime of de Plantas, nevertheless I do not think that he will refuse
U.E.G. if you wish to have any men, as he complains of the lawlessness

in the whole of Abantia. A few days ago he asked me if the Blunios were prepared to give for every assistance, to which I replied that the Blunios will of course be ready as soon as U.S.A. only begins, he replied to me "Yes, they are right to fight for their masters, the Blantō's would be glad of him, and he would be glad to have them, for they have deserved it."

Has already sent 5 messengers to Enimil but he refuses to give back the people of Apurui. This will result in the Bonting people paying all they get back those of Apurui. 10 August No 12 Same to Paul Major C. C. (Verwey) Had the pleasure today of recy news from Van Swaay that he had got permission from the President of C.C. to drive away all Bushua natives who were on English Territory not to allow them to settle on English Territory. I alone had 200 natives war arms this morning at 5 o'clock marched out with them & a couple of soldiers & arrived at Bushua at 6 am. I alone sent a messenger to Van Swaay to inform him that I was watching them. Van Swaay had had all the Bushuas on the march to drive all the Bushuas from that country, but the same time a boat was sent at Boelak with 20 soldiers. I had my people along the river on all parts keeping watch, but they had not been watching for 1/2 hour when some Bushuas came, who wounded one of my natives in the foot; when fire was at once returned & 2 Bushuas were shot. One of the killed was named Dode Kuro who had shot two Cremer here; the other was a Falch priest named Ako. Both heads were brought to me. Command Peter 2 more heads were brought from of men named Alta Kuran

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Borsoe who had fled into the bush, I ordered a detachment with part of my
people but have left 100 keeping watch in the bush with 3 of my soldiers to
catch fugitives who sometimes risk coming out of the bush at night. The spy
William Entei reported that 4 Burmas had fled into Buxine. He was given
4 soldiers to go fetch them returned with them at 9 pm. One of them escaped
from the fort this morning. Today 12 prisoners taken by my people on
Mr Swamy's side English boundary. - names given - One of them Kwoosie
identified as a close brother of Borsoe but he denies it. . .

10th August 13 Same to same (Cic C). I heard today from Coloneer of
Aporoi that 4 of the ppol ringleaders of Socorary, who
had taken a prominent part in the fight there between the French & the
Hantos were at Pehô. I sent a soldier with 10 volleys due to summon
the 4 volleys, & succeeding in getting hold of them, send them to P. They are
named Apetje Kwoosie, Idaru Kwoosie, Akro Kuffie, & Kijo Kwanthou.
I had great difficulty in getting them alive out of the hands of the natives, & they
all said that they were the murderers of the gentlemen.

13 August 15 Same to same - Today word from Mr Swamy & Borsoe
the native Emuch, Vaanariq of Borso, who took flight
out of the fort when P. was here at Pictree. Sends himi

18 October 20. Van der Elb to Bosch. Today the people of Adjeira & Apomoi came to me saying that U.S. had given the people of Adjeira a flag that the General had given me to the people of Apomoi; & formerly these two Crowns had belonged under one Colours flag. So they wished to know to which Colours they must adhere. I have with the gift of both parties let the flag be kept by the senior (ouste) Colours, who is he of Apomoi & taken in another [flag]. Tomorrow morning I shall go with the people of Adjeira to their respect a suitable place on the beach due to land our Crown.

I therefore consider it my duty to inform U.S. of this before I can proceed to give the flag back of the little people of Adjeira.

4 November 25. Van der Elb to Bosch. A messenger has come from Colours Enimil saying that Enimil wanted to come to Shewia, had also some words of the killed gentlemen to bring to you. I have for

considerable time post called Quimil to give back some of prisoners of Bassa ^{from} (30-40 persons) - still in his hands. At so far he has not done so. I expect that when Quimil comes to Eluvia you will have these given up to you, or to me or other who is scattering all the Planta people, & it will then not much trouble to get them together again, as he is sending the prisoners far into the interior & selling them as slaves.

18th November. 26. ^{Vanault Bosch} Same to Same This morning the Colvener of Bontay came before me with the Colvener of the two Cross on the river Hummadoe - named Jo Jentrai, again asking to be allowed to build a town under ^{the} flag at the river, & for a flag. I therefore took the liberty to ask the Prinse Colvener Jo Jentrai; but if U.C.G. desires to speak with Colvener Quimil, I will send him up.

If Mr Swaney goes to Wassant, I suggest it would be a good opportunity for me to go with him with some of my people to bring back the recruits, & any other hold: of subjects who may be detained here.

7 January Same to same. - Complaints of the scarcity of food stuffs - His house was in the afternoon sacrificed a man & a woman just before our house as custom for one of his Voandrijs. It is truly frightful ^{awful} beyond.

20 January Same to same Today before yesterday 2 English soldiers arrived with the gold which was some years ago placed in British hands. The King was very particularly pleased; he had us called & told me the news...

24 January Same to same In conversation today morning His Highness asked me if you would by this time have rec'd an answer from Holland about the Plantos. "If I were allowed to express my opinion I should say that all our own land people, the Chavos, & all the Limia people should be assembled, that with this force we might well ^{proceed} against the Hautos, since the people from Axxin to Accoda have separated themselves from Bonso. You most certainly need 2-3000 well armed men to capture their positions in the bush when you march on, & I think if U.S. wishes to destroy the whole coast on the Windward Coast, it can be done with 10,000 men. We can undoubtedly find these easily & quickly from our own neighbours, and "a good neighbour is better than a distant friend". U.S. knows what the Abantos are. Finally he now owes us 274 slaves, having undertaken to supply 1000 men in 12 months, & it is now 13 months he has so far not delivered more than 51 men; so that if he should fight for our Government it may well be that we shall have to wait for 6 years. U.S. is now well acquainted with their character.

to the Anobra river to attack the Pumnyang Piungyang people in a couple of days. The Pumnyang & the Brain people stood ready afterwards the Apollonia. I have informed Govt McClan of this movement. However some ammunition will be sent to the Commander of St Anthony; while the Company of Artillery has been instructed by me to prepare & direct to take over the artillery fire, taking out two soldiers for reinforcement of garrison: the Commander Govt invited to take under his own into Govt the Brain see papers, of the British forces. The general opinion is that the King of Apollonia was not pleased very far with his movement, & that all will be intended to be lost.

May 24. Recd report from Commander Boatman that Pumnyang had sent a messenger to him reporting that the King of Apollonia wished to make war on him, & at the same time asking if Govt Boatman would afford him assistance. I have replied that the distance offered for war to begin, but that no expense was to be incurred by Govt. "A very dangerous person who not only carried on the orders of H. Chief Bongo but aggravated them on his own account by his own gang." [Accused denied being present at M & C when M. & C were killed, & of the attack on Tomlayer. He admitted accompanying Bongo in his canoe in periods & was the recorder in both parts in writing; what he had carried messages to all the Hanta Colonies to direct fetch to combine with Bongo when an expedition of the white men came.]

2/ Cogafoi - Commander of the Poogies messengers of H. Chief Bongo. of Omei. Age 50.
