January 11 (Thurs). Govr Winniett arrd  
Elmina at 6 am. from Cape Coast.  
After breakfast he left for APOLONIA to  
make arrangements for rebuilding the fort  
there.

January 17. Govr Van der Eb, accompanied by  
officials, went to the bush  
Crom ANNEPO, and returned next ady.

January 18. Dr Boomsema to relieve Dr Bos-  
man, going on leave.

January 21. By proces verbal received from  
DABOKROM, 7 engels pure gold  
was produced from 121 lb(?) of washed gold  
there. This sent to Minister Colonies, as  
the 1st experiment.

January 25. The successor of the Head of  
the Native Government, or so-  
called King of Elmina, KOFFIE KONJUA, died  
this evening.

February 1 (Thurs). Dr Bosman left for

ship.

of Council & Court of Justice.

February 3. Ship "Van der Eb" arrd Axim,  
Received despatches.

The Chief of the Crom GOMOA ASSIN arrived with some of his Elders, introduced by the King of Elmina, with a complaint against the English Government, who for excessive fines had demanded 82 oz. 3 eng. from him. Having formerly belonged under the Dutch Government, they asked for a Dutch flag & protection. These people formerly actually enjoyed our protection and were controlled under the Fort at APAM, "Lijdzaamheid"; but since the war of Sir Charles Macarthy they joined the English, carried their flag, and there, since, with the whole ASSIN District, received assistance. In 1845 some of them (of GOMOA) were summoned to Cape Coast and, carrying rebelliousness so far, they stripped 5 soldiers & drove them away with a flogging. The Judicial Assessor, Maclean, proceeded (toog) thither and brought some prisoners; upon which a fine of 65 oz., included in the above amount, ensued. They acted at that time entirely as English subjects. Putting this before them, they had to admit it. I gave ~~them~~ a letter to the British Govr, ad. int. Fitzpatrick, (Govr Winniett left this Coast on 2nd inst. by barque "Fantee") stating that these people had been to me with a complaint, wherefore I asked H.E. to be willing to grant them a hearing. The result will be awaited.

February 7. Sent two persons with introduction to the British Govr.

who brought complaints that 2 of them had been put in log in WASSA, and robbed of their goods.

February 10. Asst Luttenberg died.

February 11. Govr returned from Chama.

Ship "Govr van der Eb", last from Chama, arrd; with her arrd Asst C. Meeuwssen & stores.

February 19. Dispute again arose between Qrs 1 & 2, who on 14th would have been decided with arms. By the imprisonment of some Vaandrighs of those Qrs fighting avoided. Enquired into matter this morning & adjourned it till 21st.

February 21. Meeting of Colonial Council, fixed on 19th, did not take place owing to death in family of King of Elmina. The Court of Justice sat & a man charged with murder condemned to be hung.

February 23. Dispute between Qrs 1 & 2, before the Col. Council. Inter alia the Chief Vaandrigh dismissed, & the Qrs allowed 8 days to present suitable persons for this office. Both Qrs also fined 2 oz. 8 eng. or f100.

February 26. Qrs 1 & 2 paid their fines, paid each with 40 dollars; of which 1/3 to King & Elders of Elmina, & some small costs paid.

March 1. (Thurs) According to a letter from the Govr ad.int. at Cape Coast, the people of GOMOA (Journal 5 Feb) submitted to the English Government, to his predecessor Hill, in 1843.

March 5. By Decrees 33 & 34, Stoové discharged, at own request, from office of acting "Werkmeester" of the Gold Washing; and Carpenter Mijnders appointed in his place.

March 20. Received visit from Danish Govr a.i. R.E.Schmidt -who returned to Cape Coast, and thence to Accra, on 21st.

March 25. French War Frigate "Penelope" from Grand Bassam (Capt Comte E Bouet Willaumez, Comdr of French Squadron on this Coast) arrived. Salutes. He and officers came on shore. He & Aide-de-Camp stayed the night. A Blockhouse & Factory being erected by the French Government at GRAND BASSAM, since 1843. They had had difficulties there from time to time with the natives, & sometimes it happened that the merchants' goods disembarked there were carried off. For one thing and another satisfaction was now demanded, and this not being readily obtained, violence had to follow. The people fleeing bushwards, one has run into the river of Grand Bassam with a small iron steamboat drowing only 2 feet water, and landed at the Capital, lying on the river. 360 men found themselves

opposed by about 1,200 well armed natives. A battle took place which lasted nearly 3 hours, in which the landing troops lost 4 dead & 50 wounded. On the side of the natives the dead estimated at 80, impossible to fix the number of wounded. ... The French had the greatest loss at the disembarkation, the river bank being very steep & the passage ashore so narrow that only one man could pass at a time. The people have entirely submitted. The Commander has made inspection of GRANDBASSAM river which is well navigable for ships, while one Crom succeeds another. Its length is estimated to be very extensive. The mouth itself 17 feet deep, suitable for quite large merchant ships. A branch of the river runs to CAPE LAHOU, and in some places is 2-3 miles broad.

March 26. British Govr, Fitzpatrick, passed through en route to Dixcove.

March 29. The French Frigate left.

April 9. (Monday) Ship "Van der Eb" left for Holland with despatches.

April 28. Went to DOEKOEKROM with some officials; returned next day.

May 10. (Thurs) Private reports announce the death of King Willem II at Tilburg on 17 March last.

Burgermeester Jan Smit died. (Buried next day with customary salute from St Jago).

May 20. At Elmina the Great Vaandrig of Qr No.2, ~~XXXX~~ AGUA,, called Francisco, died.

May 21. Ag Chief Engineer, Reinherd, to Boutry to examine the banks of the Boutry river, &c &c.

May 24. To Cape Coast for the birthday celebrations of Queen Victoria.

May 26. Major Derx sent his 5 year old son to Haarlem for education (by an English ship to England).

May 28. The Officer of Justice informed me of a complaint against the Chief (Landvoegd) of ABREMOE, AFFORRIE, residing at BIRASIE, as having been guilty of grave offences against the Government. The Court of Justice was accordingly convened for Wednesday next (30th).

May 30. Council held in re AFFORRIE of ABREMOE & adjourned till Saturday (2nd).

May 31. Fetich priest of ANTHONA, asisted by a number of his girls, yesterday made fetich to get rain. Last night it rained so heavily that the failure of the

harvest has been avoided as yet. Fortune was actually favourable for ANTHONA, which must positively advance him in the confidence of the natives.

June 2. (Saty) The Council, adjourned from 30th, was not held because AFFORRIE did not come up. Towards midday he sent a message that he will be at Elmina on Monday afternoon.

June 3. Heavy rains since Friday.

June 5. AFFORRIE was, in Council to-day, fined 10 oz., with arrest until payment. The demand was for 15 oz. & arrest till payment.

June 22. Penalty of 10 oz. paid by AFFORRIE; 1/3 part paid out to the King and Elders, by the Bookkeeper & Officer of Justice.

July 5. (Thurs) Report from DABOKROM of death of Ag "Werkmeester" J.J. Mijnders on 3rd.

July 12. Smallpox (pokken) begins to become much worse among the garrison (3 died from it in July).

August 2. (Thurs) Private report of death of Dr Bosman on board British barque "Fantee" on the way home.

August 3. Ceremonies in connection with mourning for death of King Willem II.

- August 4. Ceremony of Proclamation of accession of King Willem III.
- August 8. Letter from English Govr that the flag there was half mast in memory of Willem II.
- August 10. The Governor of the English Possessions, Fitzpatrick, enquired whether there had not previously been a correspondence with Govr Winniett about a system of ~~unkiy~~ duty on rum; and whether the Dutch Government would be disposed to introduce the same if this were done by the English. I have replied to H.E. that this project had been referred for the approval of the Dept of Colonies since 14 Feby 1848.
- August 14. Report from Ag Chief Engineer, Reinhaart re hæs last arrangements. Copy & reply will be sent to the Ministry.
- August 22. 18 of garrison suffering from pokken.
- August 27. "Van der Eb" arrd Axim. Despatches.

The King of Equato appeared here on 13<sup>th</sup> inst  
 & was sworn in on that day. At midday the  
sejuro sejuro proceeded to answer our complaints  
 of Q<sup>r</sup> J. & the result was that it was simply  
 decided that the question of the Schellies should  
 be regarded as ended but that Q<sup>r</sup> J. was in  
 the right.

It appears to me that, through drunkenness, <sup>of some Elunia brother</sup> this  
 matter has not exactly inquired into what they  
 gave Q<sup>r</sup> J. in the right because the Elunia King  
 is chosen out of the Q<sup>r</sup> : & just truly <sup>well worded</sup> but ~~(was)~~  
 more satisfactory. The King of Equato with  
 his people took leave, departed, & in a small street  
 in the Q<sup>r</sup> was camped, pitched & gathered  
 by a crowd of people. This outburst went so  
 far that the Elunia King sent <sup>an order</sup> ~~orders~~ to the Q<sup>r</sup>
