himself obliged to complaine in most serious
terms to their Lordships the Estates Generall of the
United Kingdom of his strange & improper way
of Proceeding, but while he is residing here on the

Wholly of the King his Master, Resolutions by way of
Answer to his Memorials shew to quin to other
Publick Ministers how & absolute & set all over
the World & yet concealed from him, & thereby without
opportunity of being ^{convinced} if anything of error
should have been said therein, we on the contrary of

Esperance) after so much money & time had been
already expended in the pursuit thereof, & many of
them ready for determination to be put in ~~the~~ ^{his} hands &
proceeded upon ^{waies} a new, according to the 15th Article

some boats therefore bin used in the bringing of them
to an issue, & that for the future better order would have
bin observed towards his Subjects, but having wasted more
above 24 Months time the conclusion of the sd Treaty

his Master himselfe in several Audiences to their
Ambassador: Yet so it is that these matters are still
so farre from being ended as that in truth they seeme
to be more rather further from it than on the day

his Majesty will yield unto them but if otherwise who will
think it strange if at last something of more to done by
them for their relieve as to what is past, & the security
of their Trade for the future.

And as to the particulars mentioned in the sd
paper to have been suffered by them from the English,
though these matters have not bin tried of
between their doings & him the sd Envoy already, but between
the King his Master & their Ambassadors at London,
& so that it is not properly his business to refer therunto but
to referre them to that measure what his Majesty hath
promised to give concerning the same, yet seeing their doings
have bin pleased with only to mention & insist thereupon in
a 'd'oes' paper, he indeed say nothing els by way of
answer to his Honorables, he cannot but say thus
much therunto

That the pieces or ships said to be taken from them were
all belonging to the West India Company of this
Country, & when it shall be considered what is the

 few years space before the conclusion of the
 late Treaty had bin taken in an hostile manner
 upon the Coast of Africa only by the shipping

 whole loadings to a very great value, & with only
 so but the men were obliged to turn very
 many more of them most barbarously &
 inhumanly treated, putt into stinking nasty
 Dungeons & holes at Castell del Uinia
 five to six in the midst of their own Excrement,
 nothing but bread & water given them, &
 thereof not enough to sustaine nature, their
 bodies tortured with exquisite and horrid
 tortures, & such as ~~they~~ dyed the living &
 the dead left together, & such as escaped
 turned out to perish by hunger or wild
 Beasts in these miserable Countries, a to be
 carried away Captives by the Pirates, by which

 good Subjects have perished and bin destroyed.
 And that not to this time notwithstanding
 all Solicitations & Endeavours yet are many of

satisfaction given to the persons concerned in any of
the sd ships, or that ever since the conclusion of
the sd Treaty, ships of War have bin kept by the
sd Company upon the sd ~~Coasts~~ Coasts, with design
they have not proceeded so farre as to take more of
the shipping of his Majesty's subjects for their Law done
that which is equivocal & as relating to that Trade,
Shipping & hindring any one, that they meet with all
^{from} the Commence & to that effect pursuing them in
an hostile manner from place to place, & whenever
any English anchor, anchoring by them, & hindring &

Extraord^y of its possibly being taken by them

to order a supper (with his prints) his subjects

 suddaine commanded thence. And whereas their

Lapps would not be well believe for they
 had provided with such singular & extraordinary
 franchise or immunities, whereas towards the
 King my Master, in communicating their
 intentions & desires as afores^d felt it with

 given to the Mayor before the communication
 of the sd. Resolutions; And though Sr John
 Dawson & his Mayors affects hapned to be
