delivered is found good reason that the Library be sent to the  
Pindie of the 50 W.C. to report there to the 1664.

The Manuscript being extraordinary here has not found  
any of the King's & Captain's letters nor ships of the States of the  
United Provinces, but certain English ships named the Library where one  
John Deu was Commander, belonging to the Company of Adventurers  
of England, being on a short stay the 26<sup>th</sup> day of February, 1662 or  
at the port of Ambo\*, on the Coast of Africa, where the 50 Company had  
then had a house & settled factory, still being then in a profitable  
& quiet trade, while she was so trading upon the 28<sup>th</sup> of the same  
month another ship of England called the Solomon by name, where  
one James Johnston was Commander, arrived at the same port, &  
on a short stay the 4<sup>th</sup> March next following, while the said John  
Deu was at a shore trading, surprised the 50 Company's boat  
with men & goods that were there in the [sic] which the John  
had intended to buy a share to be settled factory

\* Ambo = Ahanta (= Takoradi?)

& kept the same, nor would return them unless he sd Deu  
 wd agree to let saile from that place & quit his trade  
 there: at which unreasonable & unjust demand he was forced  
 to yield unto, to the great prejudice of the sd Company, for  
 that if he had lost the boate & the goods therein his whole  
 voyage had been bin over charge. That on a date the 1<sup>st</sup> of  
 the sd month, the sd Uxary arriving & coming to an  
 anchor at Comenda, where the English have constantly had a  
 trade, & where the W. Indie. Comp<sup>y</sup> of this Country had their  
 us factory, not so much as a ship in the Roads, & being there  
 in the exercise of a free trade with the natives, that the next day  
 there arriv'd there a Frigate of about 12 Guns belonging  
 to the sd Comp<sup>y</sup>, and did by force hinder her from all trade  
 there also.

That thereupon the sd Uxary sailed to Castel del Rio  
 and the sd Deu went on shore to one certain Foldenburgh  
 who styled himself the Governour of the W. Indie. Comp<sup>y</sup> of this  
 Country there, declared to him what he was, shew'd shew'd him his  
 p<sup>ps</sup> & doc<sup>ts</sup>, expatiated the injuries & violences done unto him  
 this proprietors in seizing his boate & goods & hindring  
 his trade in the places aforesd without any reason or shadow of  
 pretext, contrary to all rules of amity & good correspondence,  
 but when all would prove nothing with him, demanded  
 leave to take in some fresh water at the sd Castel (a piece

of the civilis humanity seem degraded), it could ye so flourish  
though, expressly refused to suffer them to leave any, or so they  
were counteracted to support the state ship on dry land, that they  
were at that time in great want thereof.

That coming afterwards to a place called Long (where the way  
withon Towne was broken) they arrived there the next day to find  
great flocks of 12 quins & another ship of the sd Company  
could ye (Antimo, that was broken) suffer any boat to pass to  
go for her a skaine or to save her the stone taken, as formerly  
hundred for of all that a representation of what they do.

That coming: after followe to Cape Cor where the  
English had been a fortnight, the sd Company were, yet the way  
then also in a little manner hindered for the time.

The sd Company returned: with demand for several reasons  
the assistance now to the sd Voyage say, for the damage that they  
had sustained there, & a manner for their debts were in place to  
skins such a quantity of a variety of goods that contained a  
unprofitable proceedings of the sd trade. It was found, as  
became their Justice the same or amount that they ought to  
have of the purchase of the King my Lords.
