He also goes to complain of the conduct of

but the Pañt will take immediate steps
to communicate with the Dutch Pañt

Statement of the Phil of Impulse (Bawwack)
since before we Impulse on 5th Aug 1858. Impulse

Bawwack states that about 1845 a gentleman named
in the year called his slave brother Doyen, then
Chief of Impulse & Dobos known, & informed him
that the Dutch East India Company was going to give gold
to Dobos & requested him to furnish
them as laborers.

As Doyen was in debt he agreed to do so
and informed his master, King Eninil, of his
intention. The wages of the laborers & his
stipend were then fixed ^{and he was told}
to work. Bawwack's son ^{second} went to Impulse
on behalf of his uncle to see the pay
due & while there signed a paper to
the effect that his uncle therein pledged
himself to keep his men at work steadily
& constantly & long as the Dutch East
India Company services & himself & people
were regularly paid. Bawwack's son later
did not do work as mentioned in the paper
respecting allegiance to the Dutch East
& is reported to him, were any word or

distance binding his uncle to that power more
 than that exercised above, for how could
 he induce his uncle's a father's sanction near

At TOMEN TOE, where we arrived on the 1st inst, we had not yet met with any mutual boundary, and as, according to the reports of the Native Chiefs, English villages belonging either to DIXCOVE or WASSA lay in between the Divisions of AXIM & BOUTRY, we decided to return to our respective Commands.

As will appear to YH., from the continuation of the Journal, I have however returned into my Division over Netherlands territory; and Resident Coulon has not understood my message.

At AKRAKROM is an English settlement.

I will carefully enquire whether the people acknowledge that the "land" belongs to BOSSUA, and report further to YH thereon.

-Further sends a map drawn up by Resident Coulon and him. The boundaries on it are only according to guess, as it is impossible to draw them up accurately.



As soon as the journey through the Divisions AXIM & BOUTRY is completed, the boundaries will be able to be accurately fixed.

As there was no road here to ACCODA, nor ~~one~~ to one of the Easterly villages belonging under ACCODA, we decided to return to our respective Commands. Coulon will return to Axim by way of EDJAMRA, and Doyer to Boutry by way of PATASSIE, EMFIASSIE and BOSSUA.
